**Story Point:** People welcomed Jesus to Jerusalem as their King.

**Big Picture Question:** What did Jesus do to save us? Jesus lived a sinless life, died on the cross, and rose from the dead.

**Christ Connection:** During Jesus' triumphal entry, the people welcomed Him as King. Jesus was the Messiah spoken about by the prophet Zechariah: "Look, your King is coming to you; he is righteous and victorious, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey." One day, Jesus will return to earth on a white horse as King over everything. **Key Passage:** Philippians 2:8

#### **BIBLE STORY SUMMARY:**

### Jesus' Triumphal Entry

Matthew 21; Mark 11; Luke 19; John 12

#### STORY POINT: PEOPLE WELCOMED JESUS TO JERUSALEM AS THEIR KING.

Jesus and His disciples traveled to Jerusalem. Jesus sent two of His disciples ahead into a village. "As soon as you enter the village," Jesus told them, "you will find a young donkey tied there. No one has ever sat on it. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone says to you 'Why are you doing this?' say, 'The Lord needs it.'"

The disciples did as Jesus asked. They brought the donkey to Jesus, threw their robes onto the donkey, and helped Jesus get onto it. People spread their robes along the road for Jesus, and others spread palm branches cut from the fields.

The whole crowd praised God. "Hosanna!" they said. "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Some religious leaders asked Jesus to tell His disciples to be quiet. Jesus answered, "If they did not praise Me, the rocks would praise Me!"

While Jesus was in the temple complex, people who were blind and people who were lame came to Him. Jesus healed them.

Jesus went to the town of Bethany to spend the night.

### **SMALL GROUPS:**

### Activity 1: Story Discussion/Application Activity

What to do: Review Genesis 43.

1) Why was Jacob hesitant to send Benjamin to Egypt with them? (*He was afraid that he would lose Benjamin just like had had lost Joseph and now Simeon.*) How long did he wait before allowing Benjamin to leave? (*Until they had eaten everything they had, and the choice was let him go or starve.*) What did his fear cause Jacob to do? (*He was stuck, he didn't do anything to resolve his problem because he was too afraid.*)

2) Fear doesn't necessarily have to be fear of something scary. It can be simply fear of what might happen or fear of what other will think or do in response. When are you afraid? How does fear affect your actions? Are you ever afraid of doing what you need to do or what is right to do? Can you think of any instances where this is true? Why were you afraid?

3) Read Romans 8:15. What does the Spirit not bring? (*Fear*) What does the Spirit bring? (*Adoption as sons of God.*) How are fear and adoption as God's child opposites? (*If you are God's child, you do not need to be afraid. God who is the Father knows everything and is in control of everything. God the Father cares for and loves His children. You do not need to fear the world for you are living for a God who is bigger than anything that others can do.*)

4) Think of the situations that you are fearful in? How can knowing that you are God's child change your response in those situations? What are some things that you know are right to do that might be kind of scary to do? (*Saying no to something, standing up for a friend, sharing what you believe....*) When God gives you the Holy Spirit to reside in you, the Spirit gives you the strength and power to stand up in situations where you would normally be fearful. What are some things you could do to prepare for potentially scary situations? (*Pray before hand, ask others to pray, read a Bible verse that gives you the courage to do the right thing...*)

### **Activity 2: Application activity**

**What to do:** Ask for two volunteers. Blindfold the two volunteers and have them link their hands over their heads like a "London Bridge" pose. They should stand as far apart as they can while holding hands. The rest of the kids should line up as if they were going to pass through the blindfolded students. The kids' goal is to go through the blindfolded people without getting caught. Blindfolded volunteers should try to catch the students as they walk through by dropping their arms down and catching them.

You can switch up who are the blindfolded volunteers and repeat the process if time allows.

**Bring it home:** In this activity, your goal was to make it through without getting caught. This might have been kind of nerve-wracking to a lot of you. You had to be moving fast and quietly. If you moved too slow, you were caught. Some of you may have even taken a second to compose yourselves before going through. That's how fear works. It can slow you down and make you hesitate.

Fear can be paralyzing. If you let it, it can stop you from doing things. It can make you wait too long before attempting things. It can even make you give up in the middle of doing something. God calls us to live a life free of fear because He has given us a Spirit that empowers us to live without being afraid. What are some fears that hinder you that you need to give up to God? How can you work together as a group to encourage each other and hold each other accountable to not fall into fear?

### Activity 3: Prayer / Closing

What to do: Spend time sharing prayer requests together. Ask for students to pray for the person to the right.

- memorizing the memory verse
- working on Day 1 of the take-home devotion
- review the books of the Bible
- retelling today's Bible story
